## Camp 2018

### Day 1

On Wednesday the 27<sup>th</sup> of June Keyneton Primary went to the Aldinga campsite. Our first activity was getting ourselves into teams, there were six teams with the average of five in each. Once we were in our teams we walked through the Aldinga Conservation Park to the beach. At the beach we had to make a creature out of natural resources. The things that were made were a small turtle smoking a pipe, a big turtle, a six legged jelly fish, a mermaid, a fish and a fish that ate a cat and became a catfish. Later on we got clay and baked fish inside of it; some of us ate the eyeballs. Soon after we went on the bouncy pillow and that was heaps of fun. We had a delicious barbecue dinner, sang songs around the campfire and then settled down to watch the movie "Sing".

### Day 2

On Thursday we got up early and most of the kids and adults went to the beach one last time. When we got back we had a whole day of activities ahead of us. We were split into two groups, group one went on a bush walk in the conservation park where Clem, who had Aboriginal ancestors, taught us what the plants were used for and which could be eaten, like the "shut up" tree, a super spicy plant, muntries and more. Some people even got to try the sap from the shut up tree which the elders used to give the younger people who weren't listening and it stuck their teeth together. While we were doing this, team two were painting boomerangs. In the next rotation, group one learnt about Aboriginal histories and stories while people in group two were making Aboriginal shelters, or wadlis.

### Day 3

On the last day of camp we all packed up and had some pancakes, we went onto the bouncy pillow one last time and when we came back the building had been mopped so we stayed outside while Cameron set up some activities. The aim of the game was to get special eggs from the Dori Bird but you couldn't take too long or else you would lose your memory!

I believe we would all agree that the camp was super fun and that we can't wait until next year!




